#### Reading: The Gospel of Luke Chapter 16 verses 1 – 13

Jesus told his disciples: "There was a rich man whose manager was accused of wasting his possessions. <sup>2</sup> So he called him in and asked him, 'What is this I hear about you? Give an account of your management, because you cannot be manager any longer.'

<sup>3</sup> "The manager said to himself, 'What shall I do now? My master is taking away my job. I'm not strong enough to dig, and I'm ashamed to beg— <sup>4</sup>I know what I'll do so that, when I lose my job here, people will welcome me into their houses.'

<sup>5</sup> "So he called in each one of his master's debtors. He asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?'

<sup>6</sup> "'Nine hundred gallons of olive oil,' he replied.

"The manager told him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it four hundred and fifty.'

### **Reflection**

So we have this very difficult passage. In many ways it is typically Luke - he has a way of using unedifying characters as examples of right response to a crisis. Think of, for example the reluctant friend (11.8) or unjust judge (18.2). Luke is almost teasing his reader to pursue his salvation as ruthlessly as others go after making money or salvaging their own interests and reputations.

We have to try to understand how the story works. It seems very strange to us that the master should commend the steward for doing something that will lead to him losing money. But it looks as if he, himself had been acting in an

underhand manner. Jews were forbidden to lend money and charge interest. But many people got round this by lending in kind, with oil and wheat being easy commodities to use for this purpose. It seems likely that what the steward deducted from the bill was the interest that the master had been charging, with a higher rate on oil than on wheat. If he reduced the bill in each case to the amount that had actually been lent, the debtors would be delighted but the master couldn't lay a charge against the steward without owning up tohis own shady business practices. And so the master can only admire the steward's clever approach.

We also have to remember that this is a parable not a piece of moral teaching about money and how not to use it.

When faced with a first-century Jewish story about a master and a steward, we would usually expect the master to represent God and the steward to stand for Israel. Israel is God's property – manager, set over His possessions and responsible to God. But Israel has failed in the task and is under threat of instant dismissal. What should, what could be Israel's response?

The Pharisees automatically tried to make Israel more holy by tightening up the law. This excluded the people that Jesus was reaching out to. Luke is challenging the lingering pharisaism of us, his readers. The most important message of the whole

passage is the last sentence. You cannot serve both God and money. In fact you cannot serve both God and anything else. In the past few days we have been thinking about our late Queen, Elizabeth II. I have to confess that I can remember when her father, King George VI died. I was 4. My mother always had the radio on when she was working around the house and I was playing. I didn't understand all that was said but I knew where in the day we were by the programme that was on. On the day the king died the BBC replaced their programmes with classical music which I found scary. I asked mum why 'Woman's Hour' wasn't on and she said it was because the king had died. I couldn't see the connection and wanted the frightening music to stop and the normal programmes to be played.

As we now look back over her life and reign, one of the things that stands out is the depth of her personal faith. She spoke often of her reliance on God and how He guided her through good times and bad. For her the service of God was so important.

What an example she is! If only we are remembered for our devotion to God.

### A time of thanksgiving and intercession

Gracious God, your relationship with your people is open and loving and liberating.

It is through knowing you that we discover our real humanity, and

through knowing you that we understand who we are and are set free to live as your people.

kingdom of God where peace and justice, and compassion and grace will

reign in abundance and will direct all things.
